Our Nursery

We are located in sunny Fortuna, Ca. We have a seven acre farm where everything we sell is grown. We have a nice mixture of Douglas Fir and Black Pine for the shade tolerant plants, and lots of wide open sunny space for the sun lovers!

This is our fifth year in Sunny Fortuna. We relocated from the Redwood Forest of the Santa Cruz Mountains where we took our name from.

We had outgrown our space there and wanted to grow Conifers.

We are on top of Drake hill. You may visit us with an appointment.

Our plants

We do not advertise any plant we do not have ready to ship. All of our plants are guaranteed to be true to name and disease free. Any plant mislabeled will be replaced free of charge.

A word about the size of our plants:

The majority of our plants are specimens, at least mature enough to see what they will be like when they are mature (leaf color, shape and such).

Most of our plants are in one-gallon containers. We do however, offer some 5-gallon specimens for those of you who simply cannot wait to see what the mature plants look like! All of our plants are grown in containers, starting with 2 ½ inch and going up to 5 gallons. Our growing stock is just about evenly split between clonally propagated, divisions and grafts. With the exception of the very newest varieties, all of our tissue culture plants have been grown here for at least one full year, and have been through two winters (we try to buy only tissue cultures that have already been overwintered). A quick call to us, and we can send you a digital photo of the plant in question.

Shipping

As we grow all of our plants at our nursery here in California, we realize that shipping can get expensive. We do all we can to cut down on shipping costs. We ship as much as we can bare-root. Where ever possible, we offer our plants in smaller sizes (like 4 inch pots). We do not charge for boxing your order. Shipping costs are based solely on weight and destination. We charge what the shipper charges us, nothing more.

Conifers

Abies Fir

Abies Balsamea Balsam Fir

balsam fir has deep green, glossy needles that emerge in the spring a soft light green, darkening as the season advances. Needles are short and flattened. Great for Christmas Tree or for making wreaths. **\$8.00**

Abies delavayi var. forrestii This beautiful rare Chinese fir named after George Forrest not only has wonderful foliage, but in spring its cones are a fascinating blueish-violet color. The needles are dark green with two distinct stomatal lines on their underside giving the tree an overall silvery-green appearance.

Height: in 10 years 10 feet plus. Light: Full Sun. **3rd year grafts- \$15.00**

Abies Fraseri Fraser Fir

Among the most elegant of conifers. Slow growth rate.

Shiny, compact habit. Excellent Christmas tree.

To 40', Zone 5. **2-3 Ft-\$15.00**

Abies Grandis Sear's Creek Grand Fir Glossy, dark green to bright green needles. Native throughout the Northwest. Often planted for commercial Christmas tree plantations. Up to 200', Zone 4. **2-3'-\$15.00**

Abies koreana 'Horstmann's Silberlock'

A semi-dwarf tree of exquisite beauty.

The needles curve around the stem to reveal their silvery underside.

It grows in an upright pyramid. Grows to 7 feet wide by 5 ½ feet tall.

Abies lasiocarpa Arizonica 'Glauca Compacta'

Dwarf blue Corkbark Fir. Dwarf, blue compact grower with a unusual form.

The blue is not as deep as some, but coupled with the irregular, upright habit, makes a wonderful addition. 4-6' at maturity. **3-yr graft, 18-32" -\$15.00**

Abies Nordmanniana Nordmann Fir

Densely branched from the ground up, 20' wide. Shiny, dark green needles, whitish beneath. Outstanding ornamental. Makes a wonderful Christmas as well.

100-150', Zone 4. **1-2 Ft, one gallon.- \$12.00**

Abies pinsapo 'Aurea' The golden form of Spanish fir. Full sun needed for best yellow-gold color. from southern Europe, has very distinctive, prickly, steel-blue needles; short, thick, and rounded, radiating perpendicular to the stem. This upright, full tree has ascending branches. **3rd year grafts. \$15.00**

Abies Procera Noble Fir Short, stiff, horizontal branches, with 1" blue-green

needles, Very underrated! Interesting, large cones. Native to the western U.S. 90-200', Zone 5. 1-1/2 to 2ft. One gallon- **\$7.00, 2-3'-\$15.00**

Abies procera 'Glauca'

The "Blue Noble Fir" becomes a stately 30-40' tree with horizontal branching. The powder blue needles are attractive and the cones are rather large. Sun. Zone 5. 2 Gallon **18-24" \$15.00** 5 Gallon **36-48" \$20.00**

Cedrus

Cedar

Cedrus atlantica 'Glauca Pendula'

The weeping blue Atlas cedar is best known for its extremely pendulous habit. Branches are thickly covered with steely-blue, short, thick needles of irregular length. This plant can be staked or trained to conform to any shape. Eventually develops a massive trunk. Originated in France before 1890. **3rd year grafts 2-3' \$15.00**

Cedrus deodara

The "Himalayan Cedar" is an upright pyramidal tree with horizontal branching and drooping tips. The feathery soft foliage makes a very graceful appearance. Full sun to part shade. Zone 6. **Two gallon-2Ft, \$8.00**

Cedrus deodara 'Aurea' Golden Deodara Cedar

New growth is striking yellow gold which fades with the season. Full sun is needed to maintain color on outside growth. Internal branches and any shaded areas are quick to turn green. Growth rate is 1 foot/year up to 18-24 feet. **2 ft, 1 Gallon-\$15.00**

Cedrus deodara 'Feeling Blue' A dwarf cedar with prostrate habit and powder blue needles, growing to 2' high, 4' wide in 10 years. Full sun, drought tolerant when established. **Four inch pot \$6.00, One gallon \$12.00**

Cedrus libani 'Glauca Pendula' This weeping form of the Lebanon cedar grows as an irregular narrow column, with long and pendulous branches. Dark-green, long needles clothe the tree. Occasional and random horizontal branches create an appendage look. Dramatic vertical accent! **2nd yr graft-\$12.00, 3rd yr-\$15.00**

Cephalotaxus harringtonia 'Fastigiata' Columnar Plum Yew Large, dark green, glossy leaves are arranged radially on upright stems. Grows to 6' high, 2' wide in 10 years. Good accent conifer in narrow places. **4 inch pot-\$7.00, One gallon-\$12.00**

Chamaecyparis False Cypress

It grows best in moist, well-drained soil. *Chamaecyparis pisifera* and *thyoides* do best in full sun. *Chamaecyparis obtusa* thrives in full sun but will tolerate shade.

The cultivars we offer provide a very diverse combination of color, texture, and shape for the landscape. *Chamaecyparis* is native to North America, Japan and Taiwan.

Chamaecyparis lawsoniana Port Orford Cedar

Densely pyramidal with soft graceful bluish-green foliage. Can be planted closely and sheared into a hedge, or let grow to its maximum height of 60'. 12-16"

Chamaecyparis nootkatensis 'Pendula'

A stately 25' tree with a striking weeping appearance.

The scale-like green foliage gently cascades from the broad spreading branches.

Chamaecyparis obtusa Dwarf Hinoki Cypress

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Blue Feathers' Blue Feathers Hinoki Cypress.

Blue-green juvenile foliage make this semi-dwarf hinoki a standout. Slow growing, columnar form, to 5' high, 2' wide in 10 years. Zones 5-8. **4 inch pot \$5.00.**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Blizzard' Dwarf Hinoki Cypress. Very small growing-forms a 2' X 2' globe in 10 years. Pretty cream and white variegation throughout the sage green foliage. Evergreen. Zone 5. **Four inch pot-\$6.00.**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Crippsii'

A loose, open, upright, small tree with exceptionally bright yellow foliage growing in full, elongated sprays. Grow in sun or filtered shade; does well in full sun in Oregon.

Shaded foliage is green. 12" year to 10 feet in 10 years. **One gallon-\$7.00**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Fernspray Gold'

An eye-catching small tree with arching branches. The golden yellow flattened sprays of foliage are reminiscent of the tapering growth habit of a fern frond. Full sun and ample moisture achieve the brightest gold. **One quart \$6.00 One gallon \$12.00**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Filicoides Compacta'

Green, fern-like foliage on this upright plant that will benefit from judicious pruning to maintain a more compact shape. 5-10 feet in 10 years. **One gallon-\$7.00**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Gimborns Beauty' Nice blue color. Most leaves on this plant are blue and juvenile. A very nice Japanese Hinoki Cypress. Zone 3 - 7.

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Nana Lutea' A wonderful yellow Dwarf Hinoki. Lemon-yellow, with a very dense habit. This evergreen does not like hot sun. Matures at only 2-3 Feet. Zones 4-8 **One gallon-\$10.00**

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Nana' One of the most diminutive forms of Hinoki cypress. 'Nana' is the perfect miniature conifer for rock gardens, troughs or container gardens. Its dark green foliage is tightly congested, forming a tiny mound of year around color. Hardy to zone 4-5. **One gallon-\$10.00**

Chamaecyparis pisifera

Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Boulevard' A popular garden stand-by with soft, plummy, silver-blue foliage and a very full, pyramidal habit. Originated as a sport on Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Squarrosa'. **Four inch pot-\$6.00, One gallon-\$10.00**

Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Cream Ball'

Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Curly Tops'

A wonderful plant, Curley Tops has distinctive curled needles and bright powdery blue foliage, adding textural interest and luminescent color to the landscape. Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Golden Pin Cushion'

Golden dwarf moss cypress. Very slow-growing, spreading, velvety bun. Prized plant for oriental or rock garden. Best color in full sun. **Full one gallons-\$12.00**

Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Mops'

A low, mounding form with brilliant gold, thread-like foliage. Grow in full sun for best color. Grows 3-5" per year. Maximum height is 3-4 ft. Full sun. **One gallon \$10.00**

Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Squarrosa Intermedia'

An unassuming plant with bizarre tendencies, the source of some of our most creative plant sculptures. Throughout the growing season the new thin, whip-like branches become filled in with tightly compressed juvenile foliage. This fast-growing plant is

excellent for topiary work. 3-6" per year up to 3-5 ft. Bluish Green Full sun.

***Chamaecyparis pisifera* 'True Blue'**

***Chamaecyparis pisifera* 'Tsukumo'**

***Chamaecyparis thyoides* 'Top Point'**

Blueish-green juvenile foliage, wine colored stems and a narrow form make this an excellent choice for a compact specimen. In winter the foliage has an attractive purple blush. The best selection to date of dwarf white cedar cultivars.

***Chamaecyparis thyoides* 'Compacta Glauca' (Compact Blue Atlantic White Cedar)**

Compact, conical conifer to 15' with 10' spread. Excellent silvery-blue, feathery foliaged selection that has a neater, more conical habit and is much slower growing than the species. Full sun in moist, acidic soil.

Cryptomeria **Japanese Cedar** *Elegant conifers with lacy foliage, good for sun or partial shade. Best with ample summer water and protection from cold, drying winter winds.*

Cryptomeria japonica 'Black Dragon' For the gardener who loves unique plants. 'Black Dragon' forms a wide pyramid, adorned year-round with dark green congested foliage. The ideal accent plant for a small garden. Protect from dry cold winds. 3-6 inches per year. At 10 years no more than 5 foot tall by 7 foot wide. **One quart-\$6.00. One gallon-\$10.00.**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Birodo Suki' A dwarf "Japanese Cedar" with an extremely dense, compact habit forming a broad column. The short needles are medium green, turning an attractive purple in winter. Trouble-free, no-shear, green globe. Will mature at 3-4' high. **One gallon \$10.00, 2 gallon-\$12.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Mushroom' Soft-green in spring and summer, the fine textured foliage turns a dramatic russet in the winter. Thin, evenly spaced needles on delicate branches create an open airy look. This mounding, mop-like Japanese cedar requires little to no pruning to keep its form. Protect from desiccating winds. **Globose | Zone 6. One Gallon- \$12.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Sekkan Sugi' An unmatched sulfur-yellow, upright conifer! Grows into a large tree. Very regular, ascending branches on a full, dense-foliaged, broad pyramid. May burn in prolonged heat. More than 12 inches per year. 10 feet in 10 years. **One gallon. \$10.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Spiraliter Falcata' A spiral-foliaged Cryptomeria, distinguished from 'Spiralis' by a more upright habit with thinner, light green needles and branches. The branches also twist and curve making this a collector's conversation piece. Also called 'Yore Sugi'; known before 1876. **One gallon- \$10.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Tansu' A small, dense, irregular pyramid. The needles are light to medium green, and longer in the middle of the stem. Very attractive form. Bronzes in winter. Perfect Asian style garden accent plant. **One gallon-\$12.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Tensan'
Extremely dense habit and possibly the smallest Cryptomeria cultivar available. Dark green summer color, red bronze winter color. 'Tensan' is excellent for trough or rock gardens. Sitting is important for success as it is slightly less hardy and more susceptible to frost damage than other dwarf Cryptomeria. **Big one gallons-\$12.00**

Cryptomeria japonica 'Vilmoriniana'
A popular dwarf form with a very dense, rounded shape. Needles are light-to-medium green, turning bronze-purple in winter. Grows 2-3 inches per year, reaching 1.5 to 2.5 feet. **One Gallon-\$10.00**

Juniperus **Juniper**

Juniperus chinensis 'Saybrook Gold' PPAF

The intense, brilliant yellow foliage is the reason to include this spreading juniper in the garden. Open growing, 'Saybrook Gold'® exposes woody brown branches, making it an attractive juniper on rockery walls. **One gallon-\$12.00**

Juniperus chinensis 'Shimpaku' A popular cultivar for bonsai use, and also a fine garden plant. Finely textured foliage, with a robust, green color, forms a sturdy vase shaped plant. Grows 3-6" per year, reaching 3-5'. **One gallon \$12.00**

Juniperus communis 'Compressa' A beautiful compact, narrow, conical shaped plant. 'Compressa' grows very slowly, reaching 2-3 feet after 10 years. Its spire shape works very well with any landscape design. The needles are a bluish green. It prefers full sun and is extremely hardy. Hardy to zone 2. **One gallon-\$10.00, Two Gallon-\$14.00**

Juniperus communis 'Green Carpet' The bright green new growth on this densely textured groundcover will mature to form a thick dark green carpet. This tidy compact and spreading form will mature to a 36 inch spread making it an ideal choice for smaller properties and rock gardens. Extremely hardy, 'Green Carpet' is amazing in its adaptability to diverse soil and climate conditions. **One gallon-\$10.00**

Juniperus communis 'Gold Cone' Relatively new to the trade, this columnar form of common juniper was selected for its bright golden yellow foliage in spring and summer. More vigorous than 'Compressa', this narrow plant offers wonderfully contrasting form and color for many types of gardens. 3-6 inches per year. To 4-5 Feet. **1 quart-\$6.00, 1 gallon-\$10.00**

Juniperus horizontalis 'Gold Fever' Soft juvenile foliage is a vivid yellow, contrasting with the chartreuse, inner, shaded foliage. The low-spreading habit is a stunning colorful beacon in early spring but needs proper placement to maintain the bright yellow color while preventing summer sunburn. One gallon-\$12.00

Juniperus horizontalis 'Limeglow' Feathery juvenile foliage with an electric chartreuse color growing in a spreading vase shape provides a striking contrast to other greens in the garden. This adaptable juniper withstands hot, dry conditions. 3-6 inches per year. To 3 feet spread. **One gallon-\$12.00**

Juniperus horizontalis 'Motherlode' PP#5948 'Mother Lode' is a bright, golden yellow that holds its bright color all summer in full or partial sun. Fall brings a deep yellow-orange becoming tinged with plum by winter for all-season attraction. Use as a focal point, draping over stone, or mass planting as a golden carpet. Discovered in 1982 at Iseli Nursery. 5-8" per year. 4-6 ft. Spread. Sun to partial shade. **One gallon-\$12.00, Two Gallon-\$15.00**

Juniperus scopulorum 'Witchita Blue' Very tough and adaptable plant. Drought tolerant when established. Brilliant bright-blue foliage. Good consistent upright form, especially with regular pruning. It is an evergreen with a very upright habit and a dense Pyramidal form. Hardy to zone 3, Full Sun **3-yr graft \$12.00**

Juniperus scopulorum 'Moonglow' This Juniper has wonderful, icy-blue foliage and at maturity can be a meaty 16' tall and 8-10' wide. It has a very dense branching habit, and with that it has become popular in. This plant can serve as an expansive screen when planted in quantity. Like the name suggests, under bright moonlight this plants foliage will reflect and disperse the light. It's a tough, cold-hardy evergreen that resists deer nibbling. **Four inch pot -\$6.00, One gallon-\$9.00.**

Juniperus squamata 'Blue Star'

The name 'Blue Star' is wonderfully descriptive of this immensely popular plant. As broad as high, the short branches form a star-like appearance. A witch's broom selection from 'Meyeri' found in Holland about 1950.

Juniperus squamata 'Dream Joy' New! Dwarf upright spreading form of a flaky juniper. The leaves are a bright sulfur yellow in summer. In winter the color changes to an almost blue. Grows 4-6 inches a year. Zone 4. **\$12.00**

Larix Larch

Larix decidua 'Pendula' Luminous, fresh, green foliage covers this weeping, tree in the spring. In the fall, there is a glow of yellow before the needles drop to reveal tawny twigs. With age, branching divides and spreads, creating an undulating ground cover. Prefers a moist soil in the summer. **2-3' one gallon \$20.00, 4-5' \$30.00**

Picea Spruce

Picea abies 'Acrocona' Aptly named, 'Acrocona' means "with terminal cones on the ends of branches." Even young plants feature abundant cones with their purple-red spring color. Can develop into a tree form, but the unusual coning habit tends to modify growth rate and shape to a broad pyramid. Known since about 1890, when it was found near Uppsala, Sweden, occurring spontaneously in the forest.

Picea abies 'Formanek' A very prostrate form of the Norway spruce. This plant will become a densely matted spreading carpet over time. If staked up, its branches will cascade down creating a pendulous specimen. The perfect plant to creep over and around rocks. 3-6 inches to 3-5 feet. Rare.

Picea abies 'Gregoriana Parsonsii' An irregular shape with very nice color: thickish needles, tan stems, and bright brown buds. 'Gregoryana Parsonsii' differs from 'Gregoryana' by having a slightly more open habit and needles which are longer and flatter. Dwarfed alpine appearance; the perfect rock garden specimen.

Picea abies 'Little Gem' With tiny needles and a very dense habit, this miniature is simply a wonderful plant. Originating as a witch's broom on a 'Nidiformis' around 1958, it has become an extremely popular plant, useful in a variety of garden situations with its "living rock" appearance. Less than 3" per year. Less than 1.5 to 2 ft. Full sun. **Four inch-\$6.00, One gallon-\$12.00**

Picea abies 'Pendula' Weeping Norway Spruce.

Becomes a striking picturesque specimen plant over the years!

Dark green needles accentuate the graceful, pendulous branching habit.

It is a dense weeper, leaving few open areas. Growth rate is 6-8" per year.

This plant makes an excellent choice for a landscape specimen.

Picea abies 'Tompa' Fresh green needles and a compact habit make this slow-growing Norway spruce a great selection for those smaller landscapes and rock gardens. 'Tompa's wide conical shape is similar, but a more desirable alternative, to the well-known Alberta spruce. **Two gallon \$15.00**

Silver-green foliage on beautiful pendulous branches. Very tolerant of wind, as well as wet soils. Native to the northern US and Canada. Grows up to 75'. Zone 3.

Low, cushion-shaped plant. Greyish blue-green, thin, short needles. Very slow-

Picea glauca 'Gnome' Perfect mini of the Dwarf Alberta spruce. Approximately 18 inches at 20 years. Use this tiny forest tree for special close-up scenes or plant your own instant mini forest. Slightly lighter in color, and not as tight or pointed as Jean's Dilly. Extremely slow growing, and hardy in a wide range of climates. Matures at around 18 inches! Hard to find and difficult to propagate. Limited numbers. Zones 3-8 **Four inch pot-\$17.00, One gallon-\$24.00**

Picea glauca 'Humpty Dumpty'
Short and plump, dense foliage held in a perfect pyramidal habit. Slow growing Full sun/pt. shade Dwarf. **One gallon-\$14.00**

Picea glauca 'Jean's Dilly' An extraordinary dwarf form of the popular dwarf Alberta spruce.
